ICE AGE TRAIL COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

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Hartland is looking for a few enthusiastic community members to serve on a new committee!

In 2015, the Village of Hartland was named the FIRST Ice Age Trail Community in Wisconsin. This designation exemplifies the Hartland community's commitment to promoting Hartland to users of the Ice Age Trail and to growing Hartland's understanding of the great resource and opportunity the Ice Age Trail provides. A new committee of community volunteers will spearhead the Village's efforts to cross-promote the Trail and Hartland and will serve as an advocate for the Ice Age Trail locally.

In the summer of 2015, the Village of Hartland, its Downtown Business Improvement District and a number of local interested individuals enthusiastically embraced an effort to highlight the connection between the Ice Age Trail and the Village of Hartland and its downtown in particular. Hartland was selected as an Ice Age Trail Community because the Village enjoys the presence of the Ice Age Trail through the Village's entire length and is devoted to ensuring that the Trail is as accessible as possible.

The Ice Age Trail Community designation is granted by the Ice Age Trail Alliance, whose mission is to create, support and protect the Ice Age National Scenic Trail; a thousand-mile footpath tracing Ice Age formations across Wisconsin. The Trail Community program is, at its heart, a cross promotion relationship between the Village and the Ice Age Trail Alliance. Through the Ice Age Trail Community program, the Village and the Alliance envision a partnership through which the Trail and the Alliance are promoted in the community and the local residents grow in their understanding of the Trail and its significance to the history and geology of Wisconsin and the region while, at the same time, awareness of the Village, its amenities and events improves throughout Wisconsin and beyond through the broader interest in the Trail.

In January 2016, a Village Board Resolution created the Ice Age Trail Community Committee as "a committee of area residents and other interested parties to undertake the tasks associated with planning and executing the Village's participation in the Ice Age Trail Community program and to serve as a general advocate for the Ice Age Trail in Hartland." The seven members of this committee and those other interested individuals that work with them will coordinate the Hartland community as it cross-promotes itself and the Ice Age Trail. While there are seven official members, there is plenty of opportunity for involvement and membership is not limited to residents of the village, although residents are given preference for actual committee appointment. Those interested should complete a Board and Commission Volunteer Application Form and return it to the Village Clerk. Simply note on the form that you are interested in the Ice Age Trail Community Committee. It is expected that the appointments will be made in the spring with an initial meeting by early summer 2016.

YARD WASTE SITE OPEN

As you prepare your yard for spring, please be aware that the Village's Recycle and Yard Waste Site at 701 Progress Drive will accept yard waste beginning Friday, April 1st at 9:00 am..

Normal business hours for the site are:

- Second and fourth Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:00pm
- Every Friday, 9:00am-3:00pm
- Second and fourth Saturdays, 9:00am-1:00pm

Recycling is open to all Waukesha County residents but the yard waste site is

only available to Village of Hartland residents. You will be asked to show a driver's license or ID to verify that your residence is located within the Village. Wood chips, compost and firewood are free of charge to residents and non-residents when available. Village residents may not bring large volumes of brush such as that generated by clearing lot for new home construction. Please visit the Village's website for a complete list of drop off site materials that are accepted at the site and a listing of rules that must be followed when using the recycle/yard waste drop off site.

CURBSIDE COLLECTION SERVICE

Residential property owners have received two carts; one 64-gallon for garbage and one 96-gallon for recycling. Both refuse and recycling are collected from all households curbside on Tuesdays. Refuse/garbage is collected weekly from the container provided while recyclable materials are collected every other week. The 2016 garbage/recycling calendar on the Village's website shows recycling dates as either Week A or Week B. Locate your street on the recycling map to verify your pickup week.

Residential property owners are required

to bring the carts to the curb by 6:30 a.m. on collection days. All garbage and recycling materials must be kept separate and placed inside their respective cart.

Important reminders:

- Do not place the carts in the street
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and other items such as poles and mailboxes.

DPW Seasonal Employment and Recycle Site Monitor (part-time position)

- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back by the morning after collection day

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.

DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse, prevent childhood poisonings and help protect our environment, citizens may bring their unwanted or unused prescription or over-the-counter medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals, or pet medications to the Village Hall 24 hours every day for disposal. Illegal drugs/paraphernalia are also accepted with no questions asked. Green containers are available just in-

WILEAG ACCREDITATION

In 2016, the Hartland Police Department achieved accreditation from the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group. This was the first attempt at reaching accreditation and the depart-

ment is responsible to show compliance with 205 standards applicable to law enforcement agencies. The department is one of only a few accredited agencies in the State of Wisconsin.



HOUSE NUMBERS

Municipal Ordinance 78-30 specifically states that all residential and business buildings must have the address clearly posted on the street side of the structure, with numbers being no less than 2 1/2 inches high. It is highly recommended that the numbers be reflective. This is primarily for safety reasons so that the Police or Fire Department may find the property in an emergency. Keep in mind that the 911 system tracks to an address and dispatches the correct police and fire agencies. Please make sure the numbers are clearly posted, usually near a doorway that is visible from the street.

ABANDONED VEHICLES PROHIBITED

Residents are reminded that Hartland Municipal Code Section 62-12 defines junked motor vehicles as abandoned, junked, discarded, dismantled and unregistered motor vehicles which are incapable of being self-propelled on public streets, vehicles whose owners cannot be identified and those vehicles which are without current license plates. Storage of junked motor vehicles on private property within the village is declared detrimental to the public health, welfare and safety. These vehicles are considered an attractive nuisance to children and are a peril to their safety, depreciate the value of neighboring properties and constitute a fire hazard.

The code prohibits anyone either as an owner, lessee, or occupant, to store or deposit any such vehicle on private property, street or Village owned property. The code does not prohibit the parking of an unlicensed motor vehicle or motorcycle in a private garage. In addition, this does not apply to properties occupied and used for the repair, reconditioning and remodeling of vehicles.

ILLEGAL SIGN PLACEMENT

Village ordinances prohibit the placing of any signs in a right-of-way owned by the village, county, or state. In addition, permission must be received from a property owner before placing any signs. Any signs observed to be illegally posted will be removed by the police depart-

ment and discarded. The normal violations we observe involve rummage sale signs, campaign signs and realty signs. Contact the Police Department at (262) 367-2323 if you have questions before posting signs.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS

The Police Department is a member of two nationwide notification networks. In the event an emergency message needs to be sent out to a targeted area of the community, we would utilize the services of one of these networks. The networks utilized are "A Child Is Missing" which is primarily for missing children and at-risk

adults and "MyStateUSA" which can be used for emergency notifications such as evacuations, sex offender notifications and weather related alerts. If you are interested in signing up to receive these messages on your cell phone, email police@villageofhartland.com and we will send you the information.

The Hartland Police Department is an authorized agent of the Wisconsin Dept. of Motor Vehicles to provide vehicle registration and renewal services. Call (262) 367-2323 during normal business hours if you have questions.

PHONE CHARGER SAFETY

A fire which killed five people in a house fire in the Chicago area was most likely caused by an “electrical fault involving a faulty charging device”, investigators say. But what risks do chargers pose? And what can you do to minimize these? The variety and number of mobile electronic devices that need charging is increasing all the time including mobile phones, mp3 players, laptops, tablets, e-readers.

The biggest risk posed by chargers is the availability of inexpensive generic options online, according to fire and safety experts. Chargers on auction sites are considerably less expensive than their branded counterparts but there is no guarantee they meet UL safety standards. Unofficial iPhone chargers are available on the internet at a reduced rate, however they could be the cause of a number of fires each year. It is possible that sub standard wiring is the problem with some after market charging cords.

BATTERY OVERHEATING

A central part of the safety concerns experts have with products bought online focuses on generic chargers which are advertised as being compatible with a number of devices. Officials state that because different devices require different levels of charge, generic chargers run the risk of putting too much energy into a device, causing the battery to overheat. Branded chargers are

less likely to cause that problem because they are specifically designed for each particular device. Consumers should use the charger supplied with a product whenever possible. If you cannot, the Hartland fire department recommends the purchase of approved products.

- Only buy approved chargers for products
- Follow the manufacturer’s instructions
- Contact the manufacturer directly if in doubt
- Use the right charger for the right device



OVERNIGHT CHARGING

People should also avoid leaving devices to charge unattended, especially overnight! It is important to think about where items are being left while they are charging. Keep the charging stations or areas away from combustibles. For example, if a product is charged on a flammable or combustible surface, that increases the chance of a fire spreading. HFD also warns against overloading outlets and recommends the use of proper UL approved surge protectors or outlet strips.

HOVERBOARD SAFETY

Hoverboard—part toy, part transportation. These self-balancing scooters have quickly become the latest fad. However, many hoverboards have been linked to fires. We urge you to be fire safe when using these devices.

If you purchase a hoverboard:

- Choose a device with the seal of an independent testing laboratory
- Read and follow all manufacturer directions. If you do not understand the directions, ask for help
- An adult should be responsible for charging the hoverboard
- Do not leave a charging hoverboard unattended
- Never leave the hoverboard plugged in overnight
- Only use the charging cord that came with the hoverboard
- Stop using your hoverboard if it overheats
- Extreme hot or cold temperature can hurt the battery

Hoverboards are fairly new to the mass market. Be on the lookout for updates from manufacturers and safety groups.

SIGNS OF A PROBLEM

Some hoverboard fires have involved the Lithium-Ion battery or charger. Signs you could have a problem:

- Leaking fluids
- Excessive heat
- Odor
- Sparking
- Smoke

If you notice any of these signs stop using the device right away. Call 9-1-1. If safe to do so, move the hoverboard outside away from anything that can burn.

Travel Notes

- Many airlines have banned hoverboards. If you plan to fly with a hoverboard, be sure to check with your air carrier.
- When riding in a car, keep the hoverboard where you can see it in case it shows signs of a problem.

CLOTHES DRYER SAFETY

Doing laundry is most likely part of your every day routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire.

- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often as you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks
- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed

AND DON'T FORGET...

Dryers should be properly grounded. Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing. Clothes that have come in contact with flammable substances should be laid outside to dry, then washed and dried as usual.

FACT: THE LEADING CAUSE OF HOME CLOTHES DRYER FIRES IS FAILURE TO CLEAN THEM!

BURNING PERMITS

The Village does not allow any open burning except recreational fires such as small campfires on private property or small fires confined to burning pits. Recreational fires can be no more than three feet in diameter with flames that do not reach higher than three feet from the base of the fire. These fires also must be at least 15 feet from any type of building or structure, landscape items such as a tree, bush or fence or any combustible materials and must be surrounded by non-combustible materials such as concrete, rock or cement block.

A stroke or heart attack is an emergency.

Stroke signs (F.A.S.T.)

- Face:** Facial droop, uneven smile
- Arms:** Arm numbness, weakness
- Speech:** Slurred speech, difficulty speaking or understanding
- Time:** Call 911. Get to the hospital immediately.

Heart attack symptoms

- Anxiety
- Nausea
- Back pain
- Pain that travels down one or both arms
- Chest pressure
- Fatigue
- Feeling of fullness
- Shortness of breath
- Jaw pain

Symptoms can occur up to two weeks before the heart attack.

A stroke or a heart attack is an emergency. Call 911 immediately!

Have the ambulance take you to the nearest hospital with a certified stroke or chest pain center.

A burning permit must be applied for prior to burning. Fire Department personnel will inspect the area prior to issuance of the permit to ensure safety. The cost for a burning permit is \$20 and is good for two years. Burning permits are available at the Fire Department, 150 Lawn St., weekdays between 6:00 am and 4:00 pm. The form is also available on the Village's website www.villageofhartland.com

OPEN BOOK AND BOARD OF REVIEW

The 2016 Open Book will be held on Thurs., May 26 from 2-4 p.m. in the Board Room of the Municipal Building, 210 Cottonwood Avenue. To meet with the Assessor in an informal manner during Open Book, you need to make an appointment. Online scheduling is available at www.accurateassessor.com. Click on the "Appointment Schedule" link and select the "Open Book Appointment" link. Choose the Village of Hartland from the listing of municipalities and continue to follow the steps to schedule. A password is required to make an appointment and the password for Hartland is VH10. If you do not have internet access, you may contact Accurate at 1-800-770-3927 to schedule an appointment.

Open Book refers to the time during which the entire Assess-

ment Roll (the detailed listing of the assessed value of all properties in the Village) is made available to the public. Additionally, the Assessor will be present to answer questions. Property owners with concerns about their property value are encouraged to contact the Assessor prior to the Board of Review. Changes may be made to assessments without use of the formal Board of Review process in some situations.

The 2016 Board of Review is scheduled for Wed., June 15 from 5-7 p.m. in the Board Room. Appointments are necessary and you must complete and submit an Objection Form 48 hours prior to the first meeting of the Board of Review. The Objection Form along with the "Property Assessment Appeal Guide for Wisconsin Real Property Owners" is available on the Village's website.

OPENING OF THE SPLASH PAD

PHOTO ID REQUIRED

A photo ID is required in order to vote in Wisconsin. There is no such thing as a "Wisconsin Voter ID Card". The Voter Photo ID Law allows existing photo IDs to be used by voters to prove their identity before voting. The following are acceptable forms of Photo ID and can be unexpired or expired after November 4, 2014:

- A Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license (even if driving privileges are revoked or suspended)
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card or driver license without a photo issued under the religious exemption
- Military ID card issued by a U.S. uniformed service
- A U.S. passport
- An identification card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin

In addition, these photo IDs are acceptable but must be unexpired:

- A certificate of naturalization that was issued not earlier than two years before the date of an election at which it is

presented

- A driving receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days)
- An identification card receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days)
- A photo ID card issued by a Wisconsin accredited university, college or technical college that contains date of issuance, signature of student and an expiration date no later than two years after date of issuance. The school ID must also be accompanied by a separate document that proves enrollment.
- A citation or notice of intent to revoke or suspend a Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license that is dated within 60 days of the date of the election.

The address on your ID does not have to be current. And the name on your ID does not need to be an exact match for your name in the poll book. However, your ID should look like you. Even if you've colored your hair, shaved your beard or lost some weight, as long as your photo ID reasonably resembles you, it will be accepted. SPRING BRUSH PICKUP BEGINS APRIL 11TH

All brush must be placed at the curb by Monday, April 11. The DPW will make one pass through the Village during this week. **Residents must have brush to the curb by that Monday to ensure pick up will occur.**

Please remember to follow these simple rules:

- All brush must be placed curbside by **7:30 am on Monday, April 11th**
- Brush must be placed on the curb on street edge so it does not interfere with traffic or pedestrian
- Brush **MUST** be cut into 10-foot lengths or less. Side branches more than 2 inches in diameter must be cut from the main branch
- No branches larger than 6 inches in diameter will be accepted
- All brush should be stacked into neat piles and not entangled. The cut ends should face the street for ease of collection
- No wire, plastic, metal, lumber, rail ties, stumps, rocks or gravel will be collected



- No grass clippings, leaves or other yard waste will be picked up. These items should be taken to the Yard Waste Site

FREE woodchips and compost will be available for the public after the collection is complete. These materials will be located outside of the fenced in area at the DPW Garage located at 701 Progress Drive. You will need to bring containers to collect these items.


