GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8

Polls will be open from 7 a.m.—8 p.m.

Voters are urged to plan now to make sure they have an acceptable photo ID to vote. Most voters already have one of the types of photo ID required to vote. The following are acceptable forms of photo ID.

- * Wisconsin Driver License
- * Wisconsin State ID card
- * Military ID card
- * U.S. Passport book or card
- * Veteran's ID card
- * Certificate of Naturalization (within two years of issuance)
- * Driver License receipt issued by WI DOT within 45 days of issuance
- * ID issued by a federally recognized Wisconsin Indian Tribe
- * Photo ID issued by a WI accredited university or college, or technical college along with an enrollment verification document (valid for two years from date of issue).

These IDs are still valid if expired after the date of the most recent general election which was November 4, 2014. An acceptable photo ID is not required to include a current address.

Election Day - Voters must show photo ID before a ballot will be issued.

In-person absentee voting - Voters must present photo ID just like on Election Day.

Absentee ballot by mail - A photocopy of an acceptable photo ID must be submitted with the request or the ballot cannot be mailed. However, voters who are "indefinitely confined" because of age, illness, infirmity or disability and voters in care facilities do not need a photo ID. Instead, the absentee witness verifies the voter's identify. Active members of the U.S. Armed Services who are away from home are also exempt from the photo ID requirement.

If you do not have a valid Wisconsin Driver License or State ID, you may receive a free State ID from your local DMV if you specifically request a free ID for voting purposes. For more detailed information, visit the Wisconsin Elections Commission's Photo ID website, www.bringit.wisconsin.gov.

VOTER REGISTRATION

If you are eligible to vote in the Village of Hartland but have not yet registered, you are **urged** to do so now! While you may register to vote at the polls on an Election Day, this may cause a delay particularly during a high turnout election.

- **By mail.** You may register by mail up to 20 days before an election. Your registration form must be completed legibly, signed and mailed or delivered to the Village Clerk's office. You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering. If you are registering by mail, you can use any of the forms of Proof of Residence allowed except a residential lease. Mailed registrations must be postmarked no later than October 19 for the November election.
- **In the Clerk's office.** You may register in-person up until 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election, November 4.

The Voter Registration application is available on the Village's website www.villageofhartland.com under Elections. If you have been issued a WI driver license or WI DOT-issued ID that is current and valid, you must provide the number and expiration date. You must also provide a Proof of Residence document when registering to vote. A Proof of Residence Document proves where you live in Wisconsin. A listing of acceptable documents is available on the Village website under [Possible Proof of Residence Documents](#). Not sure if you are registered to vote? Visit the MyVote Wisconsin website at myvote.wi.gov to check.


Photo ID is never required when registering to vote. Voters must reside at their address for at least 10 days by Election Day to register to vote. Voters who have moved within Wisconsin less than 10 days before the election must vote from their previous address. Voters who have moved to Wisconsin from another state less than 10 days before an election are only eligible to vote in Presidential elections.

IN-PERSON ABSENTEE VOTING

In-person absentee voting for the November 8, 2016 General Election will be conducted prior to the election as follows during the hours of 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

- **Monday, September 26** - First day to vote by in-person absentee ballot
- **Friday, November 4** (5:00 PM) - Deadline to vote in-person absentee ballot

Due to the high volume anticipated, in-person absentee voting will be conducted in the Village Board room for the November election. **You will need to show your acceptable photo ID when voting by in-person absentee ballot.** A sample ballot will be available for review on the Village website: www.villageofhartland.com under Department>Elections>Election Administration once available.



ABSENTEE BALLOT REQUEST

If you are a registered voter and prefer to vote by absentee ballot, you can complete the [Application for Absentee Ballot](#) and mail it to the Village Clerk. Your application must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on Thurs., Nov. 3 in order for an absentee ballot to be sent to you. If you have not previously provided a copy of photo ID for an absentee ballot, a copy of your acceptable photo ID must be submitted with your first absentee ballot application by mail. If you are not already registered, you will need to register to vote before an absentee ballot can be sent to you.

Voters who are indefinitely confined, meaning they have a difficult time getting to the polls due to age, illness, or disability, may request that a ballot be automatically sent to them for each election. Indefinitely confined voters do not need to provide a photo ID with their absentee ballot request. If you or someone you know are indefinitely confined you will make this selection in box 6 of the [Application for Absentee Ballot](#)

Military and Overseas voters have additional options for absentee ballot delivery. Military and permanent overseas voters do not need to provide a photo ID with their request. For more information, see the Wisconsin Elections Commission's new MyVote Wisconsin website at myvote.wi.gov

Remember, you can only vote once! A voter that has returned a completed absentee ballot is prohibited from voting at the polling place on Election Day. Absentee ballots must be received by the municipal clerk by Election Day.

HOUSE NUMBERS

Municipal Ordinance 78-30 specifically states that all residential and business buildings must have the address clearly posted on the street side of the structure, with numbers being no less than 2 1/2 inches in height (suggested to be reflective). This is primarily for safety reasons so that the Police or Fire Department may find the property in an emergency. Keep in mind that the 911 system tracks to an address and dispatches the correct police and fire agencies. Please make sure the numbers are clearly posted and visible from the street, usually posted near a doorway.



WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Winter parking restrictions in the Village are in effect from **November 1st through March 31st**. Parking restrictions prohibit parking on all village streets between the hours of 2:00 AM and 8:00 AM.

If you wish to park on the street, call 367-2323 after 3:00 PM each day to determine if parking permission is approved or denied for each morning. You may also go to www.villageofhartland.com

under Hartland Help Center for the winter parking restrictions and the most current message.

If you wish to receive daily messages about winter parking, go to Notify Me on the Village website to sign up. To receive notifications related to parking restrictions, you will need to provide an email address. If you prefer to receive these messages by text, enter your mo-

bile number.

Parking citations will be issued to vehicles that park on any village street when the message states that parking is denied. A tow notice may also be attached to a vehicle and if the vehicle is not removed in the timeframe listed on the notice, the vehicle will be towed at the owners expense.

SCHOOL IN SESSION

We remind all residents that school is back in session and everyone needs to be paying attention for kids walking, riding bikes, being helped by Crossing Guards, or loading/unloading at a bus stop. Obey the signs, slow down, proceed with caution at all times around kids!

ILLEGAL SIGN PLACEMENT

Village ordinances prohibit the placing of any signs in a right-of-way owned by the village, county, or state. In addition, permission must be received from a property owner before placing any signs. Any signs observed to be illegally posted

will be removed by the police department and discarded. The normal violations we observe involve rummage sale signs, campaign signs and realty signs. Contact the Police Department at (262) 367-2323 if you have questions before posting signs.

DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse, prevent childhood poisonings and help protect our environment, citizens may bring their unwanted or unused prescription or over-the-counter medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals, or pet medications to the Village Hall 24 hours every day for disposal. Illegal drugs/paraphernalia are also accepted with no questions asked. Green containers are available just in-

side both the east and west lobbies of Village Hall for the collection of these items. You may also use the main Police Department lobby to drop off items during normal business hours.

Please do not drop off any hazardous materials or waste such as household cleaners, paint etc. or any items containing or exposed to bodily fluids.

Remember that no medications should

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

Say goodbye to summer and hello to fall. It's school time again! Just like teachers, books, and homework go hand in hand with the school year, so should safety. Take time to review the following safety tips with your kids to help keep them safe.

Riding the bus:

- While waiting for the bus, take five giant steps back from the curb until the bus has stopped completely.
- Inside the bus, stay seated at all times.
- Keep head, arms and hands inside the bus. Never throw anything out of the bus window.
- Always hold onto the bus handrails when you are getting on or off the bus so you don't fall.
- Be careful that clothes and backpacks don't get caught in the handrails or doors.
- When getting off the bus, go to the closest sidewalk or side of the road and take five giant steps away from the bus.
- If you drop something near the bus, tell the bus driver. If you bend over to pick it up, the bus driver may not be able to see you.

Walking to school:

Children under age 10 should never cross a street without an adult.

- ◇ Choose a safe route to school. Look for the most direct route with the fewest street crossings.
- ◇ When crossing the street, stop at the curb or edge of the road.
- ◇ Look left, then right, then left again for moving cars before crossing.
- ◇ Keep looking left and right until you are safely across the street and remember to walk, not run.
- ◇ Follow all traffic signals and marking.
- ◇ Don't enter the street from between parked cars or from behind bushes or shrubs. Drivers might not be able to see you.

Riding a bike to school:

- ◆ Plan a safe route to school and have a adult ride with you the first few times.
- ◆ Children under 10 shouldn't ride on the road without an adult.
- ◆ Be sure that your helmet fits. It should sit even on top of your head—not rocking in any direction—and always fasten the safety strap.
- ◆ Learn the proper hand signals and use them when you turn or stop.
- ◆ Walk, do not ride your bike across the street.
- ◆ Come to a complete stop before entering driveways, paths or sidewalks, then look left, right and left again for bikes, cars or pedestrians heading your way.
- ◆ Do not ride your bike at night.


FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCTOBER 9-15, 2016

Fire Prevention Week is a week-long event offered by the Hartland Fire Department. Each year, school children participate in programs such as:

- ⇒ Safety videos
- ⇒ Survive Alive house equipped with upper and lower bedrooms, kitchen and simulated smoke machine. This facility allows firefighters to teach children how to react in a dangerous situation.
- ⇒ Learning about firefighter equipment
- ⇒ Spraying water from a fire hose
- ⇒ Fire safety handouts, learning about matches and other causes of fire, questions and answer quizzes and much more!

Last year over 700 grade school students visited the fire station in celebration of Fire Prevention Week.

Firefighters also visit area schools during this time with their fire trucks and fire prevention handouts.



A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.

WAKE UP CALL EXHIBIT

The nonprofit group, Your Choice to Live, Inc., opened the permanent home for its Wake Up Call exhibit at the Hartland Fire Department's Survive Alive House on August 8. The non-profit group provides alcohol and drug prevention, education, intervention and support. Since inception in 2009, Your Choice has provided services to over 300 families and spoken to over 85,000 youth in 100 middle and high schools across southeastern Wisconsin.

Wake Up Call is a life-size exhibit of a teen's bedroom (male or female) with more than 20 "red flags" that can signal drug or alcohol use. The bedroom identifies spots where teens may hide drugs, household items that can be used as drug paraphernalia and ways teens try to cover up drug and alcohol use. The goal is to educate parents and other adults who are influential in the

lives of youth so they know what seemingly innocent items can actually be an indication of substance abuse.

In addition to the Wake Up Call exhibit, Your Choice offers programs including Stairway to Heroin, which has evolved into a model program for education, prevention and recovery with a mission of making a difference in the lives of family. This four part prevention model was designed to be implemented in schools and communities to address the ongoing substance abuse epidemic adolescents and young adults are facing today.

The Wake Up Call exhibit is an educational opportunity for adults (21 years of age and older) only and youth will not be allowed to tour the bedroom. Did you know...


A segment of approximately 4.7 miles of the 1,000 mile long Ice Age National Scenic Trail passes through Hartland? The Aldo Leopold Overlook and Cottonwood Wayside, and the John Muir Overlook and Maple

Wayside are part of the trail. The Ice Age Trail also passes through Penbrook Park, Nixon Park, Bark River Park, Hartbrook Park and Centennial Park. Check it out!

MAILBOX REMINDERS

The Village of Hartland encourages every property owner with a mailbox to check for its proper location (please see the diagram) and sturdiness. Each property owner is responsible for the installation and maintenance of their mailbox and this includes having it on a sturdy base and firmly attached to its support post.

The Village's mailbox damage replacement policy states that only mailboxes that are actually hit by the snowplow and are properly installed are eligible for reimbursement. Reimbursement will not be made if a mailbox gets knocked over from the weight of recently plowed snow. A properly installed and maintained mailbox will hold up to the snow that comes off the plow's blade. The total value from reimbursement through the Village's policy is limited to a maximum of \$75.



FALL LEAF COLLECTION PROGRAM MONDAY, OCTOBER 10 – MONDAY, NOVEMBER 21

The Village-wide leaf collection program begins on Monday, October 10th and runs through Monday, November 21st. One collection pass will be made through the Village weekly as needed during the collection time. Have all leaves out to the curb by Sunday, November 20th.

Please follow these simple rules:

- Rake ONLY leaves out to the street in neat piles or a continuous tight row or rake into the gutter area
- Keep leaves away from the curb inlets.
- DO NOT BAG LEAVES
- DO NOT place yard waste, brush, garden debris or animal waste at the curb or in with the leaves. It will not be picked up.

RESIDENTIAL ELECTRONICS AND APPLIANCE RECYCLING EVENT

There will be a collection event held on Saturday, October 8 in the Village which will coincide with the normal second Saturdays in April and October. The event will be held at the recycle center site located at the Village Garage at 701 Progress Drive. Residents may also take electronics and appliances to other municipalities through this agreement with Waukesha County. There is a small fee charged to residents for any television or CRT computer monitor that is dropped off. All other eligible electronics and appliances will be taken at no cost. Animal waste needs to be disposed of in the trash. Yard waste, brush or garden debris may be taken to the Recycling/Yard Waste site at 701 Progress Drive. The schedule and rules for use of the Recycling/Yard Waste site are available on the Village's website.

Please remember that the leaf collection program is weather dependent.



CURBSIDE COLLECTION

Important reminders:

- Do not place the carts in the street
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and other items such as poles and mailboxes.
- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back by the morning after collection day

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.





Children are increasingly coming into contact with illegal drugs. According to the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, the average age of first time marijuana use is 14. The average age of first time alcohol use is 11 for boys and 13 for girls. By the time they graduate from high school 40% of all teens have used marijuana. We cannot assume that all children who smoke marijuana will become heroin addicts. However, the danger does exist, and research supports the progression of use.

Parents are still the most powerful influence in their children's lives. Children who learn about the risks of drugs and alcohol from their parents are 50% less likely to use than those who don't.
