CELEBRATE HARTLAND'S 125TH ANNIVERSARY

Join us in celebrating the Village's 125th anniversary with special events planned for Hartland's Hometown Celebration June 30, July 1 and July 2. Start the weekend off with a bang at the fireworks scheduled for Friday night at 9:30 pm. Craft vendors will be at Nixon Park from 4:00 - 8:45 pm. Enjoy the music of the Hartland Community Band from 6:30 - 8:00 pm. Live music by Montage will follow the fireworks from 9:00 - 11:00 pm. Food will be available at the park from 5:00 - 9:30 pm.

Saturday will be a fun packed day at Nixon Park starting with a 5K Family Run/Walk at 8:30 am. Fee is \$25 if registration is complete on or before June 23. Bring the kids to play in bounce houses beginning at 9:00 am, stroll the arts and crafts booths or join the History Walk that will meet at the Hartland Public Library at 10:00 am for a guided tour of the historic downtown. A family friendly obstacle course will be available from 10:00 am to noon and craft vendors return from 9:00 am - 2:00 pm.



The fun continues with afternoon activities including old fashioned games like gunny sack races, giant checkers, ring toss, and hula hoops from noon - 2:00 pm in the park. Come enjoy popcorn and an ice cream social hosted by the Hartland Fire Department and see the Department's 1938 Ford Darley pumper. Enjoy old-time music by strolling musicians, Lisa Edgar and the Razzmatazz. Endter's Beer Garden in Nixon Park will be open serving food and beverages and the splash pad will be in operation if you'd like to cool off. Interactive hands on experiences will be available for you to try out hand tools used to build pioneer cabins or kitchen tools that were used to bake pies.

Speaking of pies, we will be holding a Pie Baking Contest! Pies to be entered must be homemade and entered by the person that made it. Registration is required no later than June 18. Bakers must bring two identical pies. Following judging, the pies will be sold to attendees either by the slice or whole pie with proceeds to benefit the Hartland Area Food Pantry. Bakers may begin dropping off pies at 11:00 am with all pies being delivered no later than noon to be considered. Judging will begin at 12:15 pm. Pies will be judged on presentation, crust, filling and overall taste. If you wish to bake a pie and not have it judged, we will be happy to accept it and sell it to raise funds for the food pantry. A copy of the recipe used would be appreciated with submittal of the registration but is not required.



The celebration continues with the Hometown Celebration Parade on Sunday, July 2 beginning at 1:30 pm. This year's parade theme is "125 Years of Hartland" with many new, exciting acts. SECURITY

Please take time to keep your vehicles locked when unattended in parking lots, at work or in your driveway overnight. While Hartland enjoys a small town charm, we have crimes of opportunity especially in the warm weather months. Additionally, don't leave valuables visible in parked motor vehicles.

We receive many complaints about scams over the phone and via the internet. There are numerous variations of these scams but some general guidelines can help you from being the victim of fraud. Do not react quickly with giving money to others. Take the time to verify who and why you are giving money. If it doesn't seem right, don't do it. If you are not sure, speak to someone you trust for an opinion before acting. If in doubt, call the police department as we may have had other complaints about the particular scam.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS

The Police Department is a member of two nationwide notification networks. In the event an emergency message needs to be sent out to a targeted area of the community, we would utilize the services of one of these networks. The networks utilized are "A Child Is Missing" which is primarily for missing children and at-risk adults and "MyStateUSA" which can be used for emergency notifications such as evacuations, sex offender notifications and weather related alerts. SOUTHEASTERN WI MULTIJURISDICTIONAL IMPAIRED DRIVING TASK FORCE

We participate in a multijurisdictional task force that targets drivers who are impaired by alcohol and other drugs. On preplanned dates, departments from throughout Southeastern WI send officers out on traffic enforcement for the purpose of trying to locate impaired drivers. The dates selected are usually associated with holidays or special events that have historically been shown to have higher likelihood of impaired driving. These deployments are done on overtime and that cost is reimbursed by the WI Bureau of Transportation with funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

OTHER TRAFFIC INITIATIVES

The department participates in various national traffic initiatives during the year that are focused on safety belt use and/or impaired driving. By participating in reporting our traffic enforcement during the enforcement periods, we become eligible for \$4,000 equipment grants. Our department has received several of the grants in the past and that is how we have paid for the radar speed pole signs located on several major roads entering the village. CROSSING GUARDS

We are looking for people interested in being school crossing guards. An application is available at the police department. The regular position involves two hours of work on school days, one hour approximately 8:00am to 9:00am and one hour approximately 3:30pm to 4:30pm. We also keep a list of substitutes who fill positions as needed.

DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse and the risk of improper use of medications, the police department collects unwanted prescription medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals or pet medications in our lobbies 24 hours a day. Illegal drugs or paraphernalia may also be placed in these boxes and no questions are asked. The green containers in the Village Hall lobbies are the collection site for these items. Please do not put any hazardous materials or waste such as household cleaners, paint, etc. in the boxes. Do not flush your old medication down a toilet; bring them to us. In the last 6 months, we have collected over 375 pounds of unneeded medications that were destroyed. If you have questions, please call the Police Department at (262) 367-2323.



CITIZEN ACADEMY

Each year the department runs a Citizen Academy which is a 10-week program designed to teach people about what their local police and fire departments do. This program is a cooperative effort of Chenequa, Delafield, Hartland and Pewaukee Police Departments along with the Lake Country Fire Department. The citizens meet each week and are presented with various law enforcement or fire related topics. They have classroom instruction and hands on learning opportunities. On April 26, 2017, 15 residents from the lake country area graduated from the program. The program typically runs from February to April. Please check our website in Fall for registration if you are interested in going through this program.



ABANDONED AUTOS

Help keep Hartland looking nice. Vehicles that are abandoned, junked, discarded, dismantled and unregistered may not be stored on private property in public view according to Hartland Municipal Code Section 62-12. This does not apply to vehicles kept in private garages.

KUDOS AWARD

The Hartland Chamber of Commerce honored the Hartland Police and Fire Departments with a Kudos Award on April 20, 2017 with the theme of, "It takes a Village" for community service.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Warm weather means cookouts, Fourth of July fireworks, and all sorts of campfire fun as families across the country take advantage of the warm temperatures to get back in touch with nature. It's certainly relaxing to enjoy a bonfire with friends and loved ones, or roast marshmallows by the lake or in the backyard fire pit, but it's also important to ensure that everyone stays safe by observing a few simple fire protection guidelines.

1. Keep a bucket of water handy. If an ember floats out of your fire pit, or a log falls down from your bonfire stack and sets nearby foliage, paper, or other flammable materials aflame, you don't want to be scrambling for a way to put the fire out. Having a bucket of water nearby is a great first response tool to keep a fire under control.
2. Supervise all fireworks. Sparklers and pinwheels might seem "low risk", but the reality is that there aren't any fireworks out there that are safe enough for kids to use without adult supervision. It's also important to ensure that no one tries to re-light fireworks that don't work properly the first time. Dump these in a bucket of water and move on to the next package.
3. Don't let barbecue grease build up. Whether you're using a charcoal or a gas grill, it's important to keep it clean to prevent accidental grease fires caused by all of the gunk that can accumulate on a grill over time.
4. Inspect the area around your grill and campfire. You don't want to grill or light a campfire anywhere near other flammable materials. This includes deck railings, overhanging branches, dry grass or that pile of dry wood and recycling sitting in the back corner of your yard. If you're camping, clear out the area immediately around your grill or campfire spot to be sure that there's no scrub or brush nearby that could ignite if a spark lands on it.
5. When you're done with the fun, put out the flames. Dump water and/or sand on those embers. The same goes for grills—close your propane valve and the unit's lid, as well as any vents on a charcoal grill once you're done. Unsupervised grills can easily tip over in the wind. A breeze can pick up and carry coals and embers from that campfire, dropping them where they can ignite dry grass, branches, trees or deck planks.



NEW FIRE VEHICLE COMING SOON!

The Fire Department has been evaluating the future needs of the emergency fleet and considering long term plans to develop the best options to meet the Village's needs while maintaining fiscal responsibility. The replacement of equipment truck 4376, a 1993 rescue rig was due in 2013, (20 year replacement rotation). However, this was delayed as it was in good shape and we wanted to evaluate the department's needs in greater depth. A task force was created to forecast needs and evaluate strategic requirements as the Village continues to experience growth. The current ladder, 4371, is a 2000 Peterbuilt two person cab, 61 foot sky boom (ladder only) and is due for replacement in the year 2020 following the 20 year replacement schedule.

After many discussions and long range planning with neighboring departments the fire department staff recommended the sale of the current equipment truck (4376) and the sky boom (4371) to be replaced by one vehicle, a 101 foot aerial platform with rescue capabilities, a six person cab and a projected life span of 25 years instead of 20. (NFPA 1901 appendix D.1 recommends that apparatus over 15 years be removed from front line service and over 25 years be replaced) The price tag of a new 101 foot aerial is significant at \$989,000.00 dollars; however we expect to save nearly \$400,000.00 by combining the two vehicles. (The replacement cost for 4376 is \$400,000.00 and the ladder at \$1million plus in 2020) The new truck has been custom built to meet our "first out" fire attack requirements within the Village. The current vendor we are dealing with is willing to take the order in 2015

year end, take one year to build it (completed March 2017) and would like to show it off at the National Convention in the spring of 2017 while offering us nearly \$79,000.00 in discounts. The new truck will serve the Village residents for many years to come.

BURNING PERMITS

The discharge of fireworks is prohibited in the Village of Hartland per Section 38-3 of the municipal code.

The Village does not allow any open burning except recreational fires such as small campfires on private property or small fires confined to burning pits. Recreational fires can be no more than three feet in diameter with flames that do not reach higher than three feet from the base of the fire. These fires also must be at least 15 feet from any type of building or structure, landscape items such as a tree, bush or fence or any combustible materials and must be surrounded by non-combustible materials such as concrete, rock or cement block.

A burning permit must be applied for prior to burning. Fire Department personnel will inspect the area prior to issuance of the permit to ensure safety. The cost for a burning permit is \$20 and is good for two years. Burning permits are available at the Fire Department, 150 Lawn St., weekdays between 6:00 am and 4:00 pm. SURPRISING FACTS ABOUT HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

The month of May is National High Blood Pressure Awareness Month. What you don't know about high blood pressure could hurt you. High blood pressure affects one in three Americans yet many people with the condition don't know they have it. Uncontrolled high blood pressure raises the risk for heart disease and stroke, which are leading causes of death in the U.S. Fortunately, high blood pressure is treatable and preventable. To lower your risk, get your blood pressure checked regularly and take action to control your blood pressure if it is too high.

High blood pressure may be linked to dementia

Recent studies show that high blood pressure is linked to a higher risk for dementia, a loss of cognitive function. Timing seems to matter. Some evidence suggest having uncontrolled high blood pressure during midlife (age 45 to 65) creates a higher risk for dementia later in life. The takeaway? It's never too early to start thinking about your blood pressure and taking steps to manage it.

Young people can have high blood pressure too.

High blood pressure doesn't just happen to older adults. About one in four men and nearly one in five women age 35 to 44 have high blood pressure.. High blood pressure is a leading cause of stroke, a condition that is on the rise among younger people. Experts think the increased risk for stroke among young adults is a direct results of the rising rates of obesity, high blood pressure, and diabetes - conditions that are preventable and treatable.

High blood pressure usually doesn't have any symptoms

High blood pressure is sometimes called the "silent killer". Most people with high blood pressure don't have any symptoms, such as sweating or headaches. Because many people feel fine, they don't think they need to get their blood

pressure checked. Even if you feel normal, your health may be at risk. Talk to your doctor about your risk for high blood pressure.

Many people who have high blood pressure don't know it

About 1.1 million U.S. adults with high blood pressure aren't even aware they have it and are not receiving treatment to control their blood pressure. Most people with uncontrolled blood pressure have health insurance and visit a health care provider at least twice a year, but the condition remains undiagnosed, hidden from the doctor and patient. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is working with providers to find patients with high blood pressure who are "hiding in plain sight". Ask your provider what your blood pressure numbers mean and whether they are too high. Stick to your treatment plan and follow your provider's advice if you are diagnosed with high blood pressure.

What Can You Do

Living a healthy lifestyle can help keep your blood pressure in a healthy range and lower your risk for heart disease and stroke. A healthy lifestyle includes:

- Eating a health diet
- Maintaining a healthy weight
- Getting enough physical activity
- Not smoking
- Limiting alcohol consumption

OPEN BOOK AND BOARD OF REVIEW

The 2017 Open Book will be held on Wed., May 24 from 2-4 p.m. in the Board Room of the Municipal Building, 210 Cottonwood Avenue. To meet with the Assessor in an informal manner during Open Book, you need to make an appointment. Online scheduling is available at www.accurateassessor.com. Click on the "Appointment Schedule" link and select the "Open Book Appointment" link. Choose the Village of Hartland from the listing of municipalities and continue to follow the steps to schedule. A password is required to make an appointment and the password for Hartland is VH10. If you do not have internet access, you may contact Accurate at 1-800-770-3927 to schedule an appointment.

Open Book refers to the time during which the entire Assess-

ment Roll (the detailed listing of the assessed value of all properties in the Village) is made available to the public. Additionally, the Assessor will be present to answer questions. Property owners with concerns about their property value are encouraged to contact the Assessor prior to the Board of Review. Changes may be made to assessments without use of the formal Board of Review process in some situations.

The 2017 Board of Review is scheduled for Wed., June 14 from 5-7 p.m. in the Board Room. Appointments are necessary and you must complete and submit an Objection Form 48 hours prior to the first meeting of the Board of Review. The Objection Form along with the "Property Assessment Appeal Guide for Wisconsin Real Property Owners" is available on the Village's website.

2017 PAVING PROGRAM

Ponderosa Drive, Thornbush Circle, Pineview Court, Arlene Drive, Balsam Court, Pinyon Court, and Cedar Bend miscellaneous utility repairs and construction of diagonal parking spaces along Pawling Avenue

This summer's paving program will involve repaving and utility repair work on the above listed roadways. The utility repairs are performed in advance of the paving work and will occur on various streets in the Bristlecone Pines Subdivision from late April through the end of June. Then the paving construction work will begin in June starting with the Ponderosa Drive area then, with the Arlene Drive area with completion in October, weather depending. In addition, we will be making some minor pavement patching and sidewalk and curb and gutter repairs throughout the Village. YARD WASTE SITE OPEN

As you prepare your yard for summer, please be aware that the Village's Recycle and Yard Waste Site at 701 Progress Drive is now accepting yard waste. Normal business hours for the site are:

- Second and fourth Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:00pm
- Every Friday, 9:00am-3:00pm
- Second and fourth Saturdays, 9:00am-1:00pm

Recycling is open to all Waukesha County residents but the yard waste site is only available to Village of Hartland residents. You will be asked to show a driv-

er's license or ID to verify that your residence is located within the Village. Wood chips, compost and firewood are free of charge to residents and non-residents when available. Village residents may not bring large volumes of brush such as that generated by clearing lot for new home construction. Please visit the Village's website www.villageofhartland.com for a complete list of drop off site materials that are accepted at the site and a listing of rules that must be followed when using the recycle/yard waste drop off site.

Ways to manage yard waste:

- **Leave grass clippings on your lawn:** This practice will add valuable nutrients and can reduce the need for fertilizers.
- **Backyard composting:** Use a compost bin for your garden, yard and food waste.
- **Village's yard waste drop-off site:** Bring your yard waste to the Village's Recycle Center at 701 Progress Drive. We then grind up the material and make the mulch available so you can use it in your gardens.

HARTLAND WORK DAY

Join Waukesha County Land Conservancy, the Ice Age Trail Alliance and the Village of Hartland to help remove invasive species, such as garlic mustard and dames rocket, in the Hartland Marsh Preserve from 9:30am-1:00pm on Saturday, June 10th. The preserve protects the oak trees and is a vital habitat for songbirds, hawks, minks, turtles and other woodland animals.

Located at Cottonwood Wayside in Hartland (901 Cottonwood Avenue). Please wear appropriate clothing, have sturdy footwear and bring gloves.



CURBSIDE COLLECTION SERVICE

Residential property owners have received two carts; one 64-gallon for garbage and one 96-gallon for recycling. Both refuse and recycling are collected from all households curbside on Tuesdays. Refuse/garbage is collected weekly from the container provided while recyclable materials are collected every other week. The 2017 garbage/recycling calendar on the Village's website shows recycling dates as either Week A or Week B. Locate your street on the recycling map to verify your pickup week. Residential property owners are required

to bring the carts to the curb by 6:30 a.m. on collection days. All garbage and recycling materials must be kept separate and placed inside their respective cart. Important reminders:

- **Do not place the carts in the street**
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and other items such as poles and mailboxes.
- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back after collection

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.






