

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

We participate in traffic enforcement initiatives coordinated by the Wisconsin Bureau of Traffic Safety. Our department receives funding to add additional patrols on strategic dates such as holidays or major events to help reduce drunk driving and traffic fatalities. Participation in these initiatives and grant funds have helped to install the radar speed signs located on the main roadways in the Village. Please help keep a peaceful atmosphere in the Village by complying with the speed limit, avoid tailgating other drivers and being courteous to other drivers. We respond to traffic complaints by using a speed radar trailer at times and through enforcement in targeted areas.

FAMILY WATCHDOG

The Police Department website has a link to www.familywatchdog.us. This website is a useful tool to know where registered sex offenders live. You can put your zip code in to the search box and see where registered sex offenders live in proximity to your home or work. Keep in mind that this information is for safety and security of you and your family. This information should not be used to harass or intimidate those who are on the list of offenders.


AVOID SCAMS

We receive many complaints about scams over the phone and via the internet. There are numerous variations of these scams but some general guidelines can help you from being the victim of fraud. Do not react quickly with giving money to others. Take the time to verify who and why you are giving money. If it doesn't seem right, don't do it. If you are not sure, speak to someone you trust for an opinion before acting.

Many of these scams work because of the enticement of "free" money. Stop and think; why would a complete stranger want to over pay you for an item or funnel a large sum of money through your bank account and give you a cut of it? If you take time to think about it, it doesn't make sense, yet the desire for quick free money appeals to people. These scams also work through the illusion of an emergency situation that requires you to pay money to avoid being arrested, or a family member being taken to jail, etc. The fear created by the implied emergency causes people to act before thinking through the situation. The IRS and law enforcement actions will allow you time, provide detailed information and will allow for ways to verify information. Additionally, keep in mind that "friends" you meet or that your children meet on the internet may not be who they say they are. There are many cases reported to us each year where someone believes they have legitimate relationship with a person whom eventually needs money for an emergency. Ultimately, after the money is paid and the friend disappears, they realize the interaction over the internet was simply a grooming process for a scam. If in doubt, call the Police Department as we may have had other complaints about the particular scam.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS

The Police Department is a member of two nationwide notification networks. In the event an emergency message needs to be sent out to a targeted area of the community, we would utilize the services of one of these networks. The networks utilized are "A Child Is Missing" which is primarily for missing children and at-risk adults and "MyStateUSA" which can be used for emergency notifications such as evacuations, sex offender notifications and weather related alerts. WINTER PARKING

Each fall we remind our residents that we have a winter parking ordinance that prohibits parking on Village streets between 2:00 am and 8:00 am from November 1st through March 31st. In keeping with the spirit of the purpose of the ordinance, we evaluate the need to enforce the winter parking restriction on a daily basis. We check the forecast to determine if snow plow or salting operations are likely for each evening. In order to determine if parking on the street is permitted or prohibited each day during the winter parking season, please call 367-2323 after 3:00 pm. If you check our website you will see the status of winter parking and you can also sign up for a daily notification message.

CRIME PREVENTION

While Hartland is a safe community with a generally low crime rate, you can help prevent crime. Crimes of opportunity occur when you leave valuables in unlocked vehicles. Please be attentive to what you leave visible in your vehicle. Electronic devices, medications, cash, jewelry and any valuable items become a temptation for a thief. Keep vehicles locked and homes secure when you are not in close proximity. If you see suspicious activity report it promptly to give us the best chance to catch those committing crimes.



CITIZEN ACADEMY

The Village of Hartland Police Department sponsors a Citizen Academy along with our neighboring police departments in Chenequa, Delafield and Pewaukee as well as the Lake Country Fire Department. This is an opportunity for citizens to learn about the operations of both police and fire. Students will learn about Selected Crimes, Use of Force, Emergency Driving, Fire and EMS Response, Emergency Dispatching and many other topics related to the public safety professions. The academy is a free 9-week course that meets one night per week from 6:00 pm to 8:30 pm at the various police departments in the area. Specific information will be on the Police Department website in late fall as we are planning for the 2018 spring session.



CURFEW

For the protection of juveniles and public order the Village of Hartland has a curfew. No person under age 18 shall loiter, wander, stroll, stand or play upon any public street, sidewalk, highway or other areas as listed in the ordinance between 10:30 pm and 5:00 am. Historically we have encountered juveniles out late in the evening creating the potential for a multitude of problems. We encourage parents to know where their children are and to comply with the curfew ordinance as part of a crime prevention and safety strategy. Please see the municipal code on the Village of Hartland website www.villageofhartland.com for specific details and exemptions. Part of parental responsibility includes monitoring juveniles in your home. Underage drinking and drug use is a problem in most communities. Drug related deaths have been increasing in Waukesha County and Hartland is not exempt from this increasing problem. Please do your part to help keep our young people safe.

PARK HOURS



The Village of Hartland has many beautiful parks. In order to keep them in good shape for those who use them they are generally only open from sunrise to sunset. There are exemptions for regularly scheduled baseball and softball games, and other special events approved by the Park Board however, the police department actively enforces the closing hours as a way to prevent damage in the parks. Please keep in mind that alcoholic beverages are not permitted in our parks with the exception of fermented malt beverages, however, a permit must be obtained from the Village Administrative Office prior to possessing and consuming such beverages in the parks.

MEDICATION DISPOSAL

The Hartland Police Department has medication disposal units located in the lobbies of the Village Hall.

Please consider cleaning out your medicine cabinet and disposing of expired or excess medication in a proper manner. Medication should not be flushed down a toilet or thrown in the trash. Please do not bring hazardous materials/waste such as household cleaning products, paint, etc. Prescription or over the counter medications, sprays, ointments, creams, vials and even illegal drugs (no questions asked) may be dropped off for disposal. Medication may be dropped off at our front counter during business hours (7:30 am to 4:30 pm) or 24 hours a day in either lobby of the municipal building.

NEW PLATFORM LADDER TRUCK ARRIVES

Hartland Fire Department is pleased to announce that their new ladder truck that was in discussion, design and development for the past three years has arrived! The latest concepts and innovative technology were incorporated into the newest fire truck edition. "The new arrival weighs in at just over 82 thousand pounds and is 48 feet long" said Chief Dean. The 101 foot aerial platform ladder truck is over 11 feet high, holds 500 gallons of water and 40 gallons of foam. Under the direction of Fire Chief Dave Dean, the truck committee consisting of Lieutenant Mark Adams, Firefighter/MPO Russ Kuhl, Division Chief Rob Little, Captain Peter Walker, and Lieutenant Randy Gilmore worked for over three years in researching the current and future needs of the Village and combined them to build a multi-function emergency response vehicle that replaces two existing vehicles. The projected long term savings are estimated at just over \$400,000. "I am extremely happy in the forward thinking that the truck committee demonstrated in the planning process. I am grateful for the Village's support and patience as details and options were explored" said Chief Dean. The new aerial platform will be very visible this fall as fire department members train throughout the Village and simulate many different scenarios. "I am extremely fortunate to be the leader of such a dedicated group of individuals who are very passionate about protecting the Village residents and their property" said Dean.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCTOBER 8-14, 2017

Fire Prevention Week is a week-long event offered by the Hartland Fire Department. Each year, school children participate in programs such as:

- ⇒ Safety videos
- ⇒ Survive Alive house equipped with upper and lower bedrooms, kitchen and simulated smoke machine. This facility allows firefighters to teach children how to react in a dangerous situation.
- ⇒ Learning about firefighter equipment
- ⇒ Spraying water from a fire hose
- ⇒ Fire safety handouts, learning about matches and other causes of fire, questions and answer quizzes and much more!

It is expected that over 1,500 grade school students will visit the fire station in celebration of Fire Prevention Week. Firefighters also visit area schools during this time with their fire trucks and fire prevention handouts.

FIRE FACTS

-]]] A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire. Install smoke alarms inside every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected so that when one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
-]]] One-third of American households who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life-threatening. The time available is of ten less! Only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!



ESCAPE PLANNING - PLAN AHEAD!

If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

SAFETY TIPS

-]]] Make a home escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
-]]] Know at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.
-]]] Have an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
-]]] Practice your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
-]]] Practice using different ways out.
-]]] Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
-]]] Close doors behind you as you leave.

IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...

-]]] If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
-]]] If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
-]]] Call the fire department from outside your home.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

- ⇒ Beware of new types of high caffeine candy
- ⇒ Report any harmful items to the proper authorities
- ⇒ Check all treat wrappers for signs of tampering before eating
- ⇒ Throw away anything unwrapped. "If in doubt, throw it out!"
- ⇒ Carry a flashlight! Consider putting reflective tape on costumes
- ⇒ Costumes must be flame retardant
- ⇒ Masks can limit or block eyesight; consider painting faces with non-toxic makeup
- ⇒ Make sure that costumes fit properly and that proper walking shoes are used even if they don't match the costume. Falls are the leading cause of injuries on Halloween
- ⇒ Use a flashlight, flameless candle or glow stick instead of a candle in jack-o-lantern to prevent a fire.



HOLIDAY TREE COLLECTION

The annual Holiday Tree Collection Program will begin on Tuesday, January 2 and continue through Friday, January 12.

Trees will be collected daily during this period. Please remove all decorations, lights and stands from the trees prior to placing them at the curb; otherwise the tree will not be picked up. In addition, no wreaths will be collected. Since this a weather-related activity, if snowplowing operation is necessary, the tree collection will resume after plowing is completed.



Old strands of lights may be dropped off at the Village's Recycling Center, 701 Progress Drive, in the metal bin on Friday's between 9:00 AM - 3:00 PM beginning January 5.

NEW PAYMENT DROP BOX


For customer convenience, a new drive up payment drop box has been installed in the library municipal parking lot near the exit onto Park Avenue. Payments deposited in the drop box will be collected regularly for processing. Please do not place cash in the payment drop box.



MAILBOX REMINDERS

The Village of Hartland encourages every property owner with a mailbox to check for its proper location (please see the diagram) and sturdiness. Each property owner is responsible for the installation and maintenance of their mailbox and this includes having it on a sturdy base and firmly attached to its support post.

The Village's mailbox damage replacement policy states that only mailboxes that are actually hit by the snowplow and are properly installed are eligible for reimbursement. Reimbursement will not be made if a mailbox gets knocked over from the weight of recently plowed snow. A properly installed and maintained mailbox will hold up to the snow that comes off the plow's blade. The total value from reimbursement through the Village's policy is limited to a maximum of \$75.



FALL LEAF COLLECTION PROGRAM

MONDAY, OCTOBER 9 - TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 21

The Village-wide leaf collection program begins on Monday, October 9th and runs through Tuesday, November 21st. One collection pass will be made through the Village weekly as needed during the collection time. Have all leaves out to the curb by Sunday, November 19th. Please follow these simple rules:

- Rake ONLY leaves out to the street in neat piles or a continuous tight row or rake into the gutter area.
- Please keep leaves away from storm inlets!
- Park away from the leaves so we can access them with our trucks.
- DO NOT BAG LEAVES
- DO NOT place yard waste, brush, garden debris, branches or animal waste at the curb or in with the leaves. It will not be picked up. Animal waste needs to be disposed of in the trash.

Yard waste, brush or garden waste may be taken to the Recycling/Yard Waste site located at 701 Progress Drive. The schedule and rules for use of the Recycling/Yard Waste site are available on the Village's website. **Please remember that the leaf collection program is weather dependent.**

CURBSIDE COLLECTION

Important reminders:

- Do not place the carts in the street
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and other items such as poles and mailboxes.
- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back by the morning after collection day

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.

RESIDENTIAL ELECTRONICS AND APPLIANCE RECYCLING EVENT

There will be a collection event held on Saturday, October 14 in the Village which will coincide with the normal second Saturdays in April and October. The event will be held at the recycle center site located at the Village Garage at 701 Progress Drive. Residents may also take electronics and appliances to other municipalities through this agreement with Waukesha County. There is a small fee charged to residents for any television or CRT computer monitor that is dropped off. All other eligible electronics and appliances will be taken at no cost.
