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## WHY IS THE VILLAGE CUTTING DOWN TREES? ANSWER: EMERALD ASH BORER (EAB)

### What is Emerald Ash Borer?

The Emerald Ash Borer is a beetle that was accidentally brought into the United States on wood crate packing materials that originated in Asia. EAB larvae feeds on the inner bark of ash trees, disrupting the tree's ability to transport water and nutrients through the trees trunk. EAB has already killed tens of millions of trees in the United States where it has been detected.

### Public Trees

Public trees, those along the roadways and in our parks, are under the care and responsibility of the Department of Public Works. The Village's staff has been preparing for EAB since the outbreak indicated that it was on its way to Wisconsin. Our EAB management plan includes:

- Having a Village-wide tree survey completed that looked at the condition rating of trees
- Reviewing the ash tree database and developing treatment cost alternatives
- Chemical injection treatment of higher conditioned ash trees
- Removal of poorly conditioned street and park ash trees
- Planting replacement trees of different varieties to replace the ash trees
- Continued chemical treatment of ash trees until the EAB has left the area



We have identified at least 350 ash trees that are in need of removal. This will be completed over a 3 year period. Replacement trees will take longer to plant since we replacing not only the EAB removals but also other trees that had to be removed for a variety of reasons.

### Trees on Private Property

Trees on private property are the responsibility of the property owner. Review the information on the links below to learn how to identify an ash tree, determine if it is infested, and what to do if you suspect you have an infested or diseased tree on your private property.

Signs of an EAB infestation include tree canopy dieback, increased woodpecker activity/damage, new shoots coming from the base of the tree, bark splitting and D-shaped bore holes in the trunk.

### What do I do if my ash tree on private property is infested?

If you suspect you have an infested tree on your property we recommend you contact a private tree contractor to inspect your tree. The contractor should be International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) Certified and insured. If work is recommended, contact at least three (3) companies for quotes.

## IDENTITY THEFT

The Village of Hartland Police Department takes many different types of Identity Theft complaints every year. Some of the current reports or scams out there that we take reports on include ATM or gas pump skimmers, IRS fraud by having your social security number used to file income taxes, credit card breaches from large corporations, phishing scams in emails, people posing as utility works or government employees to gain personal information from citizens, and theft from vehicles in which criminals use the victim's credit cards and personal checks to drain your bank account.



The following are some good ideas to use to protect yourself from becoming a victim in these types of situations.

- Limit the amount of credit/debit cards you carry with you
- Do not carry your social security card or checkbook with you
- Know the contents of your wallet or purse so you can cancel credit cards quickly should you become a victim
- Do not leave valuables in your car and make sure to lock your vehicle
- Monitor your bank accounts and credit on a regular basis
- Only use secure websites while online
- Use strong passwords for your accounts and do not store your passwords on your home computer
- Have virus protection on your computer
- Use caution when using an ATM or paying at the gas pump and report any suspicious activity to the police
- Do not click on suspicious links sent to you via email or while browsing online
- Use caution if someone claiming to be a bank employee, utility worker, or government employee asks for your personal information or credit card number over the phone. This is not how these types of institutions operate. It would be wise to call the company back and see if they legitimately had an employee call you.

## SECURITY

Please take time to keep your vehicles locked when unattended in parking lots, at work or in your driveway overnight. While Hartland enjoys a small town charm, we have crimes of opportunity especially in the warm weather months. Additionally, don't leave valuables visible in parked motor vehicles.

We receive many complaints about scams over the phone and via the internet. There are numerous variations of these scams but some general guidelines can help you from being the victim of fraud. Do not react quickly with giving money to others. Take the time to verify who and why you are giving money. If it doesn't seem right, don't do it. If you are not sure, speak to someone you trust for an opinion before acting. If in doubt, call the police department as we may have other complaints about the particular scam.

## COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS

The Police Department is a member of two nationwide notification networks. In the event an emergency message needs to be sent out to a targeted area of the community, we would utilize the services of one of these networks. The networks utilized are "A Child Is Missing" which is primarily for missing children and at-risk adults and "MyStateUSA" which can be used for emergency notifications such as evacuations, sex offender notifications and weather related alerts. ## IMPAIRED DRIVING TASK FORCE

We participate in a multijurisdictional task force that targets drivers who are impaired by alcohol and other drugs. On preplanned dates, departments from throughout Southeastern WI send officers out on traffic enforcement for the purpose of trying to locate impaired drivers. The dates selected are usually associated with holidays or special events that have historically been shown to have higher likelihood of impaired driving. These deployments are done on overtime and that cost is reimbursed by the WI Bureau of Transportation with funds from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

## OTHER TRAFFIC INITIATIVES

The department participates in various national traffic initiatives during the year that are focused on safety belt use and/or impaired driving. By participating in reporting our traffic enforcement during the enforcement periods, we become eligible for \$4,000 equipment grants. Our department has received several of the grants in the past and that is how we have paid for the radar speed pole signs located on several major roads entering the village. ## DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse and the risk of improper use of medications, the police department collects unwanted prescription medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals or pet medications in our lobbies 24 hours a day. Illegal drugs or paraphernalia may also be placed in these boxes and no questions are asked. The green containers in the Village Hall lobbies are the collection site for these items. Please do not put any hazardous materials or waste such as household cleaners, paint, etc. in the boxes. Do not flush your old medication down a toilet; bring



them to us. In the last 6 months, we have collected over 375 pounds of unneeded medications that were destroyed. If you have questions, please call the Police Department at (262) 367-2323.

## ABANDONED AUTOS

Help keep Hartland looking nice. Vehicles that are abandoned, junked, discarded, dismantled and unregistered may not be stored on private property in public view according to Hartland Municipal Code Section 62-12. This does not apply to vehicles kept in private garages.

## CROSSING GUARDS

## CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF SERVICE

The Hartland Volunteer Fire Department was organized in November 1893. Money used to buy equipment, vehicles and gear was collected by fire contracts and raised through dances, annual picnics and donations. In 1958 the Village of Hartland took over the Fire Department as the governing body and to this day all equipment, buildings, vehicles and wages are paid for by the Village budget. Emergency Medical Services were added to the department in November 1978; Volunteer Firefighters and EMT's then became paid on-call members. As of 2018 we have over 56 members who are either certified firefighters or licensed emergency medical personnel. The Department is an Advanced Life Support ambulance service licensed by the State as a Paramedic Service. The department has four full-time employees and a part-time administrative assistant. All operations are operated out of one station located at 150 Lawn Street. The station is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year by dedicated professionals. The station staffing is subsidized by paid on-call and paid on premise personnel. The Hartland Fire Department is rich in history and tradition. We are always ready and proud to serve our community.



## HFD ANNOUNCES THE ADVANCEMENT TO THE EMT-PARAMEDIC LEVEL

The Hartland Fire Department has advanced to a Paramedic service as of March 5, 2018 at 00:00:01 hours. This is a great time for the Village of Hartland and the citizens we serve. By advancing to the Paramedic level we can now carry more medications and provide more advanced life-saving procedures. This has been a long term goal and is not an easy accomplishment. This could not have become a reality if it wasn't for the dedicated members, who day after day commit themselves to keeping people safe and answering the call for duty with an enthusiastic and professional attitude. We are also very fortunate to have the support from the Village Board who allowed us to make the advancement happen by hiring the additional two full-time paramedics that were needed. What a great way to start our 125th year of service to the Village of Hartland!

## PROPANE GRILLS

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill. If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

## BURNING PERMITS

The Village does not allow any open burning except recreational fires such as small campfires on private property or small fires confined to burning pits. Recreational fires can be no more than three feet in diameter with flames that do not reach higher than three feet from the base of the fire. These fires also must be at least 15 feet from any type of building or structure, landscape items such as a tree, bush or fence or any combustible materials and must be surrounded by non-combustible materials such as concrete, rock or cement block.

A burning permit must be applied for prior to burning. Fire Department personnel will inspect the area prior to issuance of the permit to ensure safety. The cost for a burning permit is \$20 and is good for two years. Burning permits are available at the Fire Department, 150 Lawn St., weekdays between 6:00 am and 4:00 pm. ## 9-VOLT BATTERY SAFETY

9-volt batteries power our smoke alarms, household items and toys. They can be found in most homes. But these batteries can be a fire hazard if not stored safely or disposed of with care.

### The problem

- 9-volt batteries can be dangerous. The positive and negative posts are close together. If a metal object touches the two posts of a 9-volt battery, it can cause a short circuit. This can make enough heat to start a fire.
- It is unsafe to store 9-volt batteries in a drawer near paper clips, coins, pens, or other batteries. Do not store common household items such as steel wool, aluminum foil, and keys near 9-volt batteries. If these items touch the two posts, there is a greater risk of a fire starting.
- Weak batteries may have enough charge to cause a fire. Some fires have started in trash when 9-volt batteries were thrown away with other metal items.



### Storing 9-volt batteries

- Keep batteries in original packaging until you are ready to use them. If loose, keep the posts covered with masking, duct, or electrical tape. Prevent the posts from coming in contact with metal objects.
- Keep them someplace safe where they won't be tossed around.
- Store batteries standing up.
- 9-volt batteries should not be stored loose in a drawer. Do not store them in containers with other batteries.

### Disposal

- 9-volt batteries should not be thrown away with trash. They can come in contact with other batteries or pieces of metal.
- 9-volt batteries can be taken to a collection site for household hazardous waste.
- To be safe, cover the positive and negative posts with masking, duct, or electrical tape before getting rid of batteries.

## GRILLING SAFETY

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

### Safety Tips

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

### Charcoal Grills

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

## OPENING OF THE SPLASH PAD

We are happy to announce that the Rotary Splash Pad at Nixon Park will be opening on Saturday, May 26th (Memorial Day weekend) for the season. The splash pad will again be operating between the hours of 10:00 am and 7:00 pm seven days a week. Use of the Splash Pad is free and is fun for children of all ages. Come on out and enjoy the cool refreshing waters of the splash pad this summer!



## OPEN BOOK AND BOARD OF REVIEW

The 2018 Open Book will be held on Wednesday, May 23 from 3-5 p.m. in the Board Room of the Municipal Building, 210 Cottonwood Avenue. **Appointments are required.** Open Book refers to the time during which the entire Assessment Roll (the detailed listing of the assessed value of all properties in the Village) is made available to the public. Additionally, the Assessor will be present during this time to answer questions. **Property owners with concerns about their property value are encouraged to contact the Assessor prior to the Board of Review.** At times, changes may be made to assessments without use of the formal Board of Review process.

The 2018 Board of Review is scheduled for Wednesday, June 20 from 5-7 p.m. in the Board Room. Appointments are necessary and you must complete and submit an Objection Form 48 hours prior to the first meeting of the Board of Review. The Objection Form along with the "Property Assessment Appeal Guide for Wisconsin Real Property Owners" is available on the Village's website.

This summer's paving program will involve repaving and utility repair work on the above listed roadways. The utility repairs are performed in advance of the paving work and will occur on various streets in the Bristlecone Pines Subdivision from mid-April through the end of June. Then the paving construction work will begin in late May starting with starting with Blue Spruce Circle, Cypress Court and Juniper Way, then continue with the Bristlecone Drive and the Arlene Drive area with completion in August, weather depending. In addition, we will be performing some pavement patching along Cardinal Lane and in miscellaneous areas throughout the Village. ## YARD WASTE SITE OPEN

As you prepare your yard for summer, please be aware that the Village's Recycle and Yard Waste Site at 701 Progress Drive is now accepting yard waste.

Normal business hours for the site are:

- Second and fourth Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:00pm
- Every Friday, 9:00am-3:00pm
- Second and fourth Saturdays, 9:00am-1:00pm

Recycling is open to all Waukesha County residents but the yard waste site is only available to Village of Hartland residents. You will be asked to show a driver's license or ID to verify that your residence is located within the Village. Wood chips, compost and firewood are free of charge to residents and non-residents when available. Village residents may not bring large volumes of brush such as that generated by clearing lot for new home construction. ## ENVIRONMENTAL CORRIDOR AND OPEN SPACE COMMITTEE

Do you want to make a difference in your Community? Are you interested in preserving the natural areas and environmental corridors within the Village? Then the Village's Environmental Corridor and Open Space Committee is a great opportunity for you to get involved. The Village of Hartland is looking for dedicated residents to help protect and maintain the Village's natural resources. The Environmental Corridor and Open Space Committee is a permanent follow-up to the Environmental Corridor and Open Space Task Force that evaluated and developed recommendations on Village-owned parcels of land that contain stands of woods, wetlands, open fields and other areas including portions of the Hartland Marsh, public parks and privately held lands.

We are looking for people to develop and implement programs, work party events and activities to follow the goals and recommendations in the Task Force Report. The committee will also help maintain an inventory of Village owned, other publically or non-profit held and privately held parcels of land that contain environmentally sensitive corridors within the boundaries of the Village of Hartland and monitor and assess the condition of those environmental areas.

## CURBSIDE COLLECTION SERVICE

Residential property owners have received two carts; one 64-gallon for garbage and one 96-gallon for recycling. Both refuse and recycling are collected from all households curbside on Tuesdays. Refuse/garbage is collected weekly from the container provided while recyclable materials are collected every other week. The 2018 garbage/recycling calendar on the Village's website shows recycling dates as either Week A or Week B. Locate your street on the recycling map to verify your pickup week. Residential property owners are required

to bring the carts to the curb by 6:30 a.m. on collection days. All garbage and recycling materials must be kept separate and placed inside their respective cart.

Important reminders:

- **Do not place the carts in the street**
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and

items such as poles and mailboxes.

- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back after collection

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.
