NEED TO REGISTER TO VOTE OR REQUEST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT?

The Wisconsin Election Commission’s website MyVote Wisconsin is ready to help . At myvote.wi.gov you can register to vote, check your voter registration status, find your polling place, see what’s on your ballot, request an absentee ballot and check provisional ballot status.

Voters who have a valid State of Wisconsin Driver License or State of Wisconsin ID card issued by the Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) can register to vote online up to 20 days before the election. To register online, the voter must enter a name, date of birth, Driver License or ID number, and an address that matches what is on file with the Wisconsin DMV. If all of the fields match, the voter will be able to register to vote completely online without needing to print, sign or mail the form and without needing to send a proof of residence document. Voters who are not able to match their information with the information in the DMV database will be given the option to register by mail.



To request an absentee ballot on myvote.wi.gov the voter must enter their name and date of birth to verify that the voter is registered. Once the record is located the voter is able to select whether the address and name located are correct. A voter may indicate that they want their absentee ballot mailed to a different address.

Next the voter will choose the elections that they would like an absentee ballot for. A voter may opt to receive an absentee ballot for all elections in the calendar year, the upcoming election or, for those that are indefinitely confined, every election in the future until the voter is no longer confined or fails to return an absentee ballot. Once submitted, the absentee ballot request is sent to the clerk’s office and the voter will receive a ballot for the election(s) selected.

Another option available on myvote.wi.gov is that a voter may see what’s on their ballot. The voter enters their street address, city and zip to conduct a search. A sample ballot for the next election will be available to view typically 47 days before an election with federal contests and 21 days before state and local contests.

Other election related questions? MyVote provides contact information for the Village Clerk including a convenient link to send an email. Registering to vote or requesting an absentee ballot is quick and convenient online.

FAMILY WATCHDOG

The Police Department website has a link to www.familywatchdog.us. This website is a useful tool to know where registered sex offenders live. You can put your zip code in to the search box and see where registered sex offenders live in proximity to your home or work. To access this information go to the [Village of Hartland website](#) and click on Services, then click Police Department, then Programs & Services. The service is extremely easy to use, contains information from all states and is updated on a daily basis to ensure that the information is as current as possible from the states which the sex offender data is received. Keep in mind that this information is for the safety and security of you and your family. This information should not be used to harass or intimidate those who are on the list of offenders.

WINTER PARKING

Each fall we remind our residents that we have a winter parking ordinance that prohibits parking on Village streets from **November 1st through March 31st** between 2:00 am and 8:00 am. In keeping with the spirit of the purpose of the ordinance, we evaluate the need to enforce the winter parking restriction on a daily basis. We check the forecast to determine if snow plow or salting operations are likely for each evening. In order to determine if parking on the street is permitted or prohibited each day during the winter parking season, please call 367-2323 after 3:00 pm. If you check our website you will see the status of winter parking and you can also sign up for a daily notification message.

CRIME PREVENTION

While Hartland is a safe community with a generally low crime rate, you can help prevent crime. Crimes of opportunity occur when you leave valuables in unlocked vehicles. Please be attentive to what you leave in your vehicle. Electronic devices, medications, cash, jewelry and any valuable items become a temptation for a thief. Parks and health clubs are particularly susceptible to thieves as people have a tendency to keep their purse or wallet locked in the vehicle while working out or using the park. Keep vehicles locked and homes secure when you are not in close proximity. If you see suspicious activity, report it promptly to give us the best chance to catch those committing crimes.

Follow the Hartland PD on Twitter and receive information about our department, safety messages or incident information.

MEDICATION DISPOSAL

In order to reduce substance abuse, prevent childhood poisonings and help protect our environment, citizens may bring their unwanted or unused prescription or over-the-counter medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals, or pet medications to the Village Hall 24 hours a day for disposal. Illegal drugs/paraphernalia are also accepted with no questions asked. The Hartland Police Department has green medication disposal units located just inside both the east and west lobbies of the Village Hall for the collection of these items. Medication may be dropped off at our front counter during business hours (7:30 am to 4:30 pm) or 24 hours a day in either lobby of the municipal building.



Consider cleaning out your medicine cabinet disposing of expired or excess medication in a proper manner. Please do not drop off hazardous materials/waste such as household cleaning products, paint, etc. or any items containing or exposed to bodily fluids. This service is for private citizens; businesses are responsible for disposal of their own items.

Remember that no medication should ever be disposed of by flushing down a toilet or being thrown in the trash. Let us dispose of them properly for you. If you have any questions regarding this program, please contact the Police Department at (262) 367-2323.

CITIZEN ACADEMY

The Village of Hartland Police Department sponsors a Citizen Academy along with our neighboring police departments in Chenequa, Delafield and Pewaukee as well as the Lake Country Fire Department. This is an opportunity for citizens to learn about the operations of both police and fire. Students will learn about Selected Crimes, Use of Force, Emergency Driving, Fire and EMS Response, Emergency Dispatching and many other topics related to the public safety professions. The academy is a free 9-week course that meets one night per week from 6:00 pm to 8:30 pm at the various police departments in the area. Specific information will be on the Police Department website in late fall as we are planning for the 2019 spring session.



PARK HOURS

The Village of Hartland has many beautiful parks. In order to keep them in good shape for those who use them they are generally only open from sunrise to sunset. There are exemptions for regularly scheduled baseball and softball games, and other special events approved by the Park Board however, the police department actively enforces the closing hours as a way to prevent damage in the parks. Please keep in mind that alcoholic beverages are not permitted in our parks with the exception of fermented malt beverages, however, a permit must be obtained from the Village Administrative Office prior to possessing and consuming such beverages in the parks.



HALLOWEEN IS NEAR...GET YOUR SAFETY TIPS HERE!

The night is quickly approaching when the streets will be filled with ghosts and goblins, not to mention princesses and fairies. As always, there are a few important Halloween safety tips that should be observed to ensure a fun-filled holiday.

Costume Safety

- Wear clothing that is bright, reflective and flame-retardant
- Do not wear long, baggy or loose costumes or oversized shoes to avoid tripping
- Use face paint and avoid masks, particularly if the eye holes obstruct the child's vision
- Don't wear floppy hats or wigs that could slide over the eyes.
- Avoid toy weapons. If desired, use costume knives and swords that are flexible, not rigid

Pedestrian Safety

- Children should stay within familiar areas and surroundings. Parents should establish a route for children.
- Children should use flashlights and stay on sidewalks.
- Cross streets at corners and crosswalks and not between parked cars.
- Motorists should drive slowly and watch for children

General Safety

- Check all treat wrappers for signs of tampering before eating

- Throw away anything unwrapped. "If in doubt, throw it out!"
- Children should never go into homes - stay on the porch or stoop when asking for treats.
- Avoid homes that don't have their outside lights turned on
- Children should never talk to strangers or get into strangers' cars
- Keep pets indoors on Halloween to protect them from hazards and prevent them from being aggressive to visitors.
- Be aware of the route that your children plan to follow.
- Teach your children to recognize the places along his/her route where they can obtain help if needed.




COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS

HARTLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT IS CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY

The Hartland Volunteer Fire Department was organized in November 1893. Money used to buy equipment, vehicles and gear was collected by fire contracts and raised through dances, an annual picnic and donations. In 1958 the Village of Hartland took over the Fire Department as the governing body, and to this day all equipment, buildings, vehicles and wages are paid for by the Village budget process.

When the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) was added to the department in November 1978, the Volunteer Firefighters and EMTs became paid on-call members responding to fire and rescue calls.



2018 FIRE PREVENTION CAMPAIGN

This year's campaign, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere," works to educate people about three basic but essential steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire and how to escape safely in the event of one.

"LOOK" for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and take care of them.

"LISTEN" for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your outside meeting place, which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should know to meet.

"LEARN" two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Fire Prevention Week is a week-long event offered by the Hartland Fire Department. Each year, school children participate in programs such as:

- ⇒ Safety videos
- ⇒ Survive Alive house tours equipped with a bedroom, kitchen and simulated smoke machine. This facility allows firefighters to teach children how to react in a dangerous situation.
- ⇒ Learning about firefighter equipment
- ⇒ Spraying water from a fire hose
- ⇒ Fire safety handouts, learning about matches and other causes of fire, questions and answer quizzes and much more!

It is expected that over 1,500 grade school students will visit the fire station in celebration of Fire Prevention Week. Firefighters also visit area schools during this time with their fire trucks and fire prevention handouts.



ABSENTEE VOTING FOR NOVEMBER 6 ELECTION

Any qualified elector who is registered to vote is eligible to request an absentee ballot. Under Wisconsin law, voters do not need a reason or excuse, such as being out of town of Election Day, to vote absentee. Any voter who prefers to vote by absentee ballot may request one. You have several options for requesting an absentee ballot and casting your vote. If you are not already registered, you will need to register to vote before an absentee ballot can be sent to you.



Request an Absentee Ballot by Mail - Just complete the [Application for Absentee Ballot](#) available on the Village website and submit it to the Clerk's office. You will also need to provide a copy of your photo ID with your request. The application must be received in our office no later than 5:00 p.m. on Thurs., Nov. 1. Applications are also available in our office.

Request an Absentee Ballot Online - Registered voters may use www.myvote.wi.gov to request an absentee ballot by clicking "Vote Absentee". This request must be made no later than 5:00 p.m. on Thurs., Nov. 1 in order for an absentee ballot to be mailed to you.

In-Person Absentee Voting - You may also vote absentee in-person at the Clerk's office beginning Oct. 15 during normal office hours. You will need to show a photo ID for voting when voting an in-person absentee ballot. You will vote your ballot immediately, seal your ballot in the proper envelope and return it to a staff member. No ballots may be taken out of the clerk's office.

HOLIDAY TREE COLLECTION

The annual Holiday Tree Collection Program will begin on Wednesday, January 2 and continue through January 11.

Trees will be collected daily during this period. Please remove all decorations, lights and stands from the trees prior to placing them at the curb; otherwise the tree will not be picked up. In addition, no wreaths will be collected. Since this a weather-related activity, if snowplowing operation is necessary, the tree collection will resume after plowing is completed.



Old strands of lights may be dropped off at the Village's Recycling Center, 701 Progress Drive, in the metal bin on Friday's between 9:00 AM - 3:00 PM beginning January 4.

PAYMENT DROP BOX


For customer convenience, a new drive up payment drop box has been installed in the library municipal parking lot near the exit onto Park Avenue. Payments deposited in the drop box will be collected regularly for processing. Please do not place cash in the payment drop box.



MAILBOX REMINDERS

The Village of Hartland encourages every property owner with a mailbox to check for its proper location (please see the diagram) and sturdiness. Each property owner is responsible for the installation and maintenance of their mailbox and this includes having it on a sturdy base and firmly attached to its support post.

The Village's mailbox damage replacement policy states that only mailboxes that are actually hit by the snowplow and are properly installed are eligible for reimbursement. Reimbursement will not be made if a mailbox gets knocked over from the weight of recently plowed snow. A properly installed and maintained mailbox will hold up to the snow that comes off the plow's blade. The total value from reimbursement through the Village's policy is limited to a maximum of \$75.



FALL LEAF COLLECTION PROGRAM

MONDAY, OCTOBER 8 - MONDAY, NOVEMBER 19

The Village-wide leaf collection program begins on Monday, October 8th and runs through Monday, November 19th. One collection pass will be made through the Village weekly as needed during the collection time. Have all leaves out to the curb by Sunday, November 18th. Please follow these simple rules:

- Rake ONLY leaves out to the street in neat piles or a continuous tight row or rake into the gutter area.
- Please keep leaves away from storm inlets!
- Park away from the leaves so we can access them with our trucks.
- DO NOT BAG LEAVES
- DO NOT place yard waste, brush, garden debris, branches or animal waste at the curb or in with the leaves. It will not be picked up. Animal waste needs to be disposed of in the trash.



Yard waste, brush or garden waste may be taken to the Recycling/Yard Waste site located at 701 Progress Drive. The schedule and rules for use of the Recycling/Yard Waste site are available on the Village's website. **Please remember that the leaf collection program is weather dependent.**

CURBSIDE REFUSE/RECYCLING COLLECTION

Important reminders:

- Do not place the carts in the street
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and other items such as poles and mailboxes.
- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back by the morning after collection day

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.

RESIDENTIAL ELECTRONICS AND APPLIANCE RECYCLING EVENT

There will be a collection event held on Saturday, October 13 from 9:00 am to noon. The event will be held at the recycle center site located at the Village Garage at 701 Progress Drive. Residents may also take electronics and appliances to other municipalities through an agreement with Waukesha County.
