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REVALUATION OF PROPERTY ASSESSMENTS

A revaluation of property assessments in the Village occurred for the 2019 assessment year. A detailed letter of introduction was sent to all property owners approximately 2 weeks prior to on-site inspections. The inspections included the measuring and listing of the exterior of all buildings and a color photo of all primary buildings. By the end of the review, all properties in Hartland were reviewed/inspected.

Revaluation notices are expected to be sent to property owners in early June 2019. The Open Book will be held at the Hartland Village Hall on June 25, 2019 from 10:00 AM to 12:45 PM and 2:00 PM to 7:00 PM and June 26, 2019 from 10:00 AM to 12:45 PM and 2:00 PM to 5:00 PM. This is an opportunity to speak with the Appraisers on a one-on-one basis. Appointments are recommended; please call Grota Appraisals at 262-253-1142 to reserve a specific time. The assessment roll and sales books will also be available to view; no appointment is needed for this.

If you prefer, you may email the Appraiser prior to the Open Book at mikes@wi-assessor.com (residential) or mike@wi-assessor.com (commercial). Property and assessment information may also be viewed using the www.assessordata.org website.

While the total overall assessed value for the Village increased approximately 16%, the increase for individual properties may be different due to the relevance of the prior assessed value, the age, location, property type and price range. An increase in assessed value does not necessarily result in a tax increase. The purpose of a revaluation is to distribute the tax burden fairly and equitably among the taxable properties. A revaluation does *not* increase taxes or increase the Village's Tax Base. If your percent change in value after the revaluation is less than the average, your percentage share of the total municipal taxes may go down.

The Board of Review will be held on July 31, 2019 from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM at Village Hall for the purpose of hearing sworn oral testimony regarding the objection to the assessed value of the property. This meeting is by appointment only; 48 hour notice prior to the Board of Review is required. If you wish to attend, contact the Village Clerk, Darlene Igl, at 262-367-2714 for a formal "Objection to Property Assessment" form, to be completed and returned prior to receiving an appointment before the Board.

CROSSWALK SAFETY

Here is some important information to know when you are walking across the street or driving a car on a roadway. Wisconsin state Statute 346.24 explains the duties of both pedestrians and drivers when a pedestrian is crossing the roadway. There are three important points to remember when walking or driving on the roadway as it relates to crosswalks (MARKED OR UNMARKED) or when approaching an intersection:

1. The driver of a car/truck shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian, bicyclist, or electric personal assistive mobility device, consistent with the safe use of the crosswalk by anyone crossing the roadway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk. The pedestrian has to be in the crosswalk (marked or unmarked)!
2. No pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk, run, or ride into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is difficult for the operator of the vehicle to yield.
3. Whenever any vehicle is stopped at an intersection or crosswalk to permit a pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device to cross the roadway, the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.



IDENTITY THEFT

The Village of Hartland Police Department takes many different types of Identity Theft complaints every year. Some of the current reports or scams out there that we take reports on include ATM or gas pump skimmers, IRS fraud by having your social security number used to file income taxes, credit card breaches from large corporations, phishing scams in emails, people posing as utility workers or government employees to gain personal information from citizens, and theft from vehicles in which criminals use the victim's credit cards and personal checks to drain your bank account.

The following are some good ideas to use to protect yourself from becoming a victim in these types of situations.

- Limit the amount of credit/debit cards you carry with you.
- Do not carry your social security card or checkbook with you.
- Know the contents of your wallet or purse so you can cancel credit cards quickly should you become a victim.
- Do not leave valuables in your car and make sure to lock your vehicle.
- Monitor your bank accounts and credit on a regular basis.
- Only use secure websites while online.
- Use strong passwords for your accounts and do not store your passwords on your home computer.
- Have virus protection on your computer.
- Use caution when using an ATM or paying at the gas pump and report any suspicious activity to the police.
- Do not click on suspicious links sent to you via email or while browsing online.
- Use caution if someone claiming to be a bank employee, utility worker, or government employee asks for your personal information or credit card number over the phone. This is not how these types of institutions operate. It would be wise to call the company back and see if they legitimately had an employee call you.

- Businesses and government agencies will not ask for payments to be made through wire transfers or gift cards.

POLICE DEPARTMENT CHANGES

In February of this year, Officer Robert Jewell took on new responsibilities within the Hartland Police Department. Robert has been assigned to the newly created position of "Patrol Detective". As a Patrol Detective, Robert will handle cases, such as child abuse, sexual assaults, suspicious deaths, financial crimes and many others. He will work the other half of his shifts on patrol, answering calls for service. We look forward to Det. Jewell working in his new capacity as Patrol Detective.

OTHER TRAFFIC INITIATIVES

The department participates in various national traffic initiatives during the year that are focused on safety belt use and/or impaired driving. By participating in reporting our traffic enforcement during the enforcement periods, we become eligible for \$4,000 equipment grants. Our department has received several of the grants in the past and that is how we have paid for the radar speed pole signs located on several major roads entering the village. DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse, prevent childhood poisonings and help protect our environment, private citizens can bring their prescription or over the counter medications, ointments, inhalers, patches, non-aerosol sprays, creams, vials, and pet medications to the police department. The green containers in both of the Village Hall lobbies are the collection sites for these items and are available 24 hours a day. Items **NOT** accepted include illegal drugs, needles/sharps, mercury thermometers, aerosol cans, bio hazardous materials (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), flares, personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, etc...), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, chemicals,



oil, or gas) or acids. Do not flush your old medication down a toilet; bring them to us. In the last 6 months, we have collected 482 pounds of unneeded medications that were destroyed.

SECURITY

Please take time to keep your vehicles locked when unattended in parking lots, at work or in your driveway overnight. While Hartland enjoys a small town charm, we have crimes of opportunity especially in the warm weather months. Additionally, don't leave valuables visible in parked motor vehicles.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS

The Police Department is a member of two nationwide notification networks. In the event an emergency message needs to be sent out to a targeted area of the community, we would utilize the services of one of these networks. The networks utilized are "A Child Is Missing" which is primarily for missing children and at-risk adults and "AlertSense" which can be used for emergency notifications such as evacuations, sex offender notifications and weather related alerts. ABANDONED AUTOS

Help keep Hartland looking nice. Vehicles that are abandoned, junked, discarded, dismantled and unregistered may not be stored on private property in public view according to Hartland Municipal Code Section 62-12. This does not apply to vehicles kept in private garages.

GRILLING SAFETY

Propane Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak by smell or soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill and get it serviced by a professional before using. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. **DO NOT MOVE THE GRILL.**

- ⇒ Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- ⇒ The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- ⇒ Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- ⇒ Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- ⇒ Never leave your grill unattended.
- ⇒ Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.



Charcoal Grills

- ⇒ There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- ⇒ If you use a starter fluid use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- ⇒ Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- ⇒ There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- ⇒ When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container. **DO NOT DISPOSE OF HOT COALS IN THE TRASH!**

Cooking Equipment on Balconies

For other than one and two family dwellings, **NO FUEL** for a hibachi grill, charcoal grill or other similar devices used for cooking, heating, or any other purpose, shall be **STORED** or kindled on any balcony or under any overhanging portion or within 10 feet of any structure. Electric grills may be used **ONLY** if they are UL listed and do not have an exposed heating element. The State of Wisconsin adopted NFPA1 2012 Fire Prevention Code which restricts the use of cooking grills for residential multifamily buildings of three or more units.

Definition of Balcony: Platform on wall of building: a platform projecting from the interior or exterior wall of a building, usually enclosed by a rail or parapet.



BURNING PERMITS

The Village does not allow any open burning except recreational fires such as small campfires on private property or small fires confined to burning pits. Recreational fires can be no more than three feet in diameter with flames that do not reach higher than three feet from the base of the fire. These fires also must be at least 15 feet from any type of building or structure, landscape items such as a tree, bush or fence or any combustible materials and must be surrounded by non-combustible materials such as concrete, rock or cement block. Be sure to check the wind speed in your area; the wind velocity shall not exceed 9 mph. Is it safe to burn? Visit dnr.wi.gov to view daily burning restrictions and danger.

A burning permit must be applied for prior to burning. Fire Department personnel will inspect the area prior to issuance of the permit to ensure safety. The cost for a burning permit is \$20 and is good for two years. Burning permits are available at the Fire Department, 150 Lawn St., weekdays between 7:30 am and 4:00 pm. The form is also available on the Village's website

FIREWORK SAFETY

How hot does a sparkler burn?


- Water boils at 212 °F
- Cakes bake at 350 °F
- Wood burns at 575 °F
- Glass melts at 900 °F
- Sparklers burn at 1200 °F

Facts

- Fireworks cause an average of almost 18,500 reported fires per year.
- Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room firework injuries. They burn hot enough to cause third-degree burns!

Be Safety Smart!

- Be safe. If you want to see fireworks, go to a public show put on by experts.
- Do not use consumer fireworks.
- Keep a close eye on children at events where fireworks are used.



Did you know that July is the peak month for grill fires including both structure, outdoor or unclassified fires. Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

YARD WASTE SITE OPEN

As you prepare your yard for summer, please be aware that the Village's Recycle and Yard Waste Site at 701 Progress Drive is now accepting yard waste.

Normal business hours for the site are:

- Second and fourth Tuesdays, 6:00pm-8:00pm
- Every Friday, 9:00am-3:00pm
- Second and fourth Saturdays, 9:00am-1:00pm

Recycling is open to all Waukesha County residents but the yard waste site is only available to Village of Hartland residents. You will be asked to show a driver's license or ID to verify that your residence is located within the Village. Wood chips, compost and firewood are free of charge to residents and non-residents when available. Village residents may not bring large volumes of brush such as that generated by clearing lot for new home construction. Please visit the Village's website www.villageofhartland.com for a complete list of drop off site materials that are accepted at the site and a listing of rules that must be followed when using the recycle/yard waste drop off site.



COVENTRY WATER TOWER PAINTING

The Coventry Water Tower, located behind 732 Coventry Lane, is scheduled for sandblasting and painting soon. Sandblasting must be done prior to painting to remove the multiple layers of existing paint that have applied to the water tower over its life, which will allow the new paint to adhere properly. It is anticipated that work will begin in early May and will take approximately eight weeks, weather permitting. The scope of the project will consist of several steps. Water will be emptied from the tower and arms will be temporarily welded to the tower to support the canopy which will contain sandblasting material. Once sandblasting is complete, the tower will be primed and painted. Finally, the Village will fill the tower and test the water quality. The fact that this tower will be empty during this process will have no impact on water in your home as the Village has two other water towers that will remain in service.

Ways to manage yard waste:

- **Leave grass clippings on your lawn:** This practice will add valuable nutrients and can reduce the need for fertilizers.
- **Backyard composting:** Use a compost bin for your garden, yard and food waste.
- **Village's yard waste drop-off site:** Bring your yard waste to the Village's Recycle Center at 701 Progress Drive. We then grind up the material and make the mulch available so you can use it in your gardens.

CURBSIDE COLLECTION SERVICE

Residential property owners have received two carts; one 64-gallon for garbage and one 96-gallon for recycling. Both refuse and recycling are collected from all households curbside on Tuesdays. Refuse/garbage is collected weekly from the container provided while recyclable materials are collected every other week. The 2019 garbage/recycling calendar on the Village's website shows recycling dates as either Week A or Week B. Locate your street on the recycling map to verify your pickup week. Residential property owners are required

to bring the carts to the curb by 6:30 a.m. on collection days. All garbage and recycling materials must be kept separate and placed inside their respective cart.

Important reminders:

- **Do not place the carts in the street**
- Place carts with the handles and wheels facing away from the street
- Containers must be at least 3 feet apart from each other and

items such as poles and mailboxes.

- Do not place your containers out earlier than the day before collection day and be sure to take them back after collection

Households that may need additional capacity for refuse and recycling have several options including the purchase of additional collection service. Households that are physically unable to move the containers to the curbside are encouraged to contact the Village.


